

Director's Annual Report 2022

The Algonquin and Lakeshore Catholic District School Board (ALCDSB) covers a wide geographic area of more than 16,000 square kilometres from Whitney in the North, Picton in the South, Trenton in the West and Kingston in the East. The ALCDSB serves approximately 12,288 students in 32 elementary schools, five secondary schools and five adult learning sites and employs over 1,440 full-time equivalent staff.

The Algonquin and Lakeshore Catholic District School Board has some of the highest secondary school graduation rates in Ontario, offers a wide range of programs across its Catholic system, including a focus on the Science of Reading as per the Ontario Human Rights Commission (OHRC) Right to Read inquiry report recommendations, Indigenous and outdoor education, mental health and well-being. Another area of focus and growth is the International Education and International Baccalaureate programs. The ALCDSB also offers a range of French as a Second Language (FSL) programs, including French Immersion, Core French and Extended French. French Immersion is offered at five locations across the Board. The Board boasts numerous specialty programs, including 14 Specialist High Skills Majors, Ontario Youth Apprenticeship and Co-operative Education Programs. The ALCDSB focuses on a Universal Design for Learning Framework (UDL), which allows the Board to meet the needs of all learners by removing barriers and designing learning supports that are necessary for some but good for all learners.

The Algonquin and Lakeshore Catholic District School Board Leadership Strategy invests in the development of our aspiring leaders for positions of additional responsibility.

Aspiring Catholic Leadership Part 1 provides an opportunity for future school and system leaders to grow their leadership capacity through discussion, reflection, and discernment of their own leadership potential. Participants reflect on vision, values, influence, and motivation within the context of Catholic education and leadership at ALCDSB through an exploration of the Personal Leadership Resources from the Ontario Leadership Framework.

Aspiring Catholic Leadership Part 2 builds on foundational principles of leadership as explored in Part 1. In this course, participants focus on the Core Leadership Capacities that empower School Level Leadership practices in the Catholic Leadership Framework.

Our goal as a system is to cultivate future Catholic leaders who will help advance the work we do to create a system of excellence based on our common faith story and the best professional practice at all levels.

The Algonquin and Lakeshore Catholic District School Board focuses on the individual strengths and areas of growth of all students. We are committed to the belief that all teachers are "special" educators. In our Catholic school system, we aim to prepare all students to be contributing members of their community. The needs of our students with exceptionalities will be met through programs and services which foster the atmosphere of a Catholic School Community in the most enabling environment while providing equitable access to learning opportunities that honour the unique and diverse abilities and needs of all students. Our inclusive classroom settings provide opportunities and experiences with the goal of each student reaching their full potential where each child is loved, inspired and successful.

The ALCDSB believes in creating modern teaching spaces that promote collaborative learning and teaching which fully support the UDL approach to teaching. With the support of Ministry of Education funding, the ALCDSB is currently working on the unprecedented construction of five (5) major capital school projects that will create new facilities which will accommodate approximately 2,100 elementary students in keeping with our Board's vision. Once the construction work is completed, our Board will have invested over \$70 million dollars to create new school buildings at Kingston West Catholic School, St. Joseph Catholic School, Our Lady of Mount Carmel Catholic School, St. Gregory Catholic School and J.J. O'Neill Catholic School.

The Algonquin and Lakeshore Catholic District School Board was established in 1998 after the amalgamation of two Catholic boards in the area, Frontenac Lennox and Addington Roman Catholic Separate School Board and Hastings and Prince Edward Roman Catholic Separate School Board. The ALCDSB is proud of its long history of delivering quality Catholic education, where each member is loved, inspired and successful.

Catholic education in the ALCDSB is nurtured by the home-school-parish relationship. The annual **Pastoral Themes 2020-2025** will support the ALCDSB's Multi-Year Strategic Plan and will continue to nurture the members of home, school, and parish. Each annual theme is enriched with connections to Scripture,

The ALCDSB pastoral themes were intentionally selected in a particular sequence. Each subsequent theme is intended to build on the previous theme. The first theme, "All Are Welcome in This Place", reminds us that as a

Catholic education community, our first step is to establish relationships and ensure that every person feels a genuine sense of belonging. Once this is established, we can learn more about what it means to be valued as "Beloved Children of God", called to celebrate the inherent dignity of each

All intermediate teachers and Administrators kicked off the 2021-2022 school year by attending the C3 (Curiosity Creates Change) Conference to build capacity around Inquiry-Based Learning (IBL). Schools will embed inquiry goals in their School Improvement Plan for Student Achievement and Well-being (SIPSAW) that will focus on Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics, Robotics, United Nations Sustainable Goals, and Community Connected Experiential Learning.

Reaching Every Reader



During the 2021-2022 school year Special Assignment Teachers (SATs) worked in 27 schools providing direct support to 115 educators, 35 Early Childhood Educators (ECEs), and 30 school leaders. The group focused on spreading phonological and phonemic awareness and systematic, explicit and multisensory phonics instruction. This work is in line with recommendations from the OHRC's Right to Read inquiry report. Reaching Every Reader education resources have been put together by a team of 433 ALCDSB staff. The videos, resources, documents and teaching supports for educators, school leaders and parents are available in both English and French.



The 2022-2023 school year started off with professional learning around fluency for educators who are new to the ALCDSB, as well as those who are teaching primary for the first time this year.

The work of the ALCDSB was acknowledged in the 2021-22 Ontario Human Rights Commission (OHRC) Annual Report, in its Education section. The Board's Reaching Every Reader professional development plan is a key action in the Achievement and Innovation Priority and aligns very well with the recommendations in the OHRC's Right to Read inquiry report.

DELF

For the first time in three years, the ALCDSB was able to offer the Diplôme d'études en langue française (DELF) Proficiency Exam to over 60 Core French, Extended and French Immersion students registered in a Grade 12 French as a Second Language course. Thanks to the dedication and time of our DELF trained ALCDSB educators for their assistance with running exams at three different secondary sites in June.



Grade 4 Math Project

Last year's grade 4 math pilot project put sound and reflective reasoning at the core of students' math learning. Students were provided with opportunities to build self-awareness, personalize their learning pathways in partnership with their teacher, and increase their self-efficacy as they learn to advocate for themselves in the learning process.

Resource Management

Upgrades & Improvements to School Sites

The Board is currently completing improvements at 19 of the Board's school sites and is making improvements to ventilation systems, classrooms, learning commons, washrooms, gymnasiums, stairwells and roofs among other areas.

The ALCDSB continues to make the improvement of ventilation systems at our sites a priority by ensuring regular inspection and servicing of our systems. Ventilation upgrades through the use of stand-alone HEPA filtration units and the completion of extensive work will improve and optimize ventilation and air filtration within our schools.

ALCDSB Human Resources Department New Employee Onboarding & Orientation

The New Employee Onboarding and Orientation Program is an example of Human Resources, Payroll Services and Learning Technology Services (LTS) working together to streamline our business operations to provide for a more comprehensive and timely onboarding program. The New Employee Portal provides new hires with all of the information they will need to make an effective transition and be a successful and inspired member of the ALCDSB team.

Aspiring Catholic Leadership



In the ALCSDB we believe that student achievement and well-being is fostered through the development of high-quality leadership. During the 2022-2023 school year the Catholic Leadership Development Program is being offered as a twopart program to staff to support them in their professional and personal leadership journey.

OHS Systems



Occupational Health and Safety training is available to all employees through the Vector Solutions platform. An online incident reporting system ensures that incidents are reported in a timely manner with a view to ensuring corrective action can be taken. Risk assessments have been completed on positions, and we are in the process of developing a training matrix to support employees in the work they do.

Device Equity Plan



LTS has begun the process of standardizing the number of devices in all schools. This equity project will take three years to complete with the first ten schools scheduled for fall 2022.

All elementary classrooms will receive 15 devices, while high schools will receive 1 device for every 2 students.

New School in Kingston West

Construction is underway in the Woodhaven subdivision where the new K-8 school will provide ALCDSB students with outstanding opportunities for learning in both French and English. Construction of the dual stream school is part of the province's capital investment program to support students with better learning spaces.

Our Lady of Mount Carmel Catholic School

The Visioning Process for the Our Lady of Mount Carmel Catholic School (OLMC) site upgrades took place virtually over a three-day period in February.

J.J. O'Neill Catholic School

The \$9.9 million dollar addition will include updates for 331 elementary student spaces, consisting of 14 classrooms, a new three-room childcare facility to accommodate 49 new licensed childcare spaces and construction will replace the existing kindergarten room and regular classrooms.



New School Site in Picton

In September the ALCDSB received approval from the Province of Ontario for the acquisition of land on Talbot Street in Picton's west end for building a 354-pupil replacement school for St. Gregory Catholic School, currently located on Owen St. in Picton.











Provincial EQAO Results 2021-2022*










Percentage of first-time eligible students who were fully successful

Business & Financial Services

The role of the Business and Financial Services Department is to provide support and direction to all Board staff in the areas of finance and business operations. The department provides the following services: Financial, Budgeting, Accounting, Payroll, Purchasing, Transportation, Planning, Physical Facilities and Maintenance Services.

2021-2022 Budget

On June 21, 2022, the Board of Trustees passed an operating budget of \$177.3 million.

The above chart illustrates how the Board's \$177.3 million operating budget for the year 2021-2022 was allocated.

"One of the five-year MYSP strategies of the Financial Services department is to achieve ongoing efficiencies which will allow us to free up resources that can be redirected to other priorities of the ALCDSB school system. The entire department worked diligently on finding ways to improve current processes including electronic employee files in Payroll Services and automated high-volume purchase requisitions in Accounting Services. We are also very excited to collaborate with Human Resources and Learning Technology Services on an employee onboarding workflow project with the goal of streamlining central processes in the areas of recruitment and staffing."
