FACES TAMMY SHERRILL

"Faces" highlights individuals whose devotion to Mary is truly inspiring.

Within 24 hours, Tammy Sherrill's life imploded. Totally unprepared for what happened, she needed a miracle.

Tammy's story began like any other day. She got up, readied her children for school, and then proceeded to work as a security guard at The Miraculous Medal Shrine. On this particular day, the Shrine was busy, so when her personal cell phone rang, she immediately sent it to voice mail. Not expecting anything urgent, she waited for a break to listen to the message. What happened next took her totally off guard.

"[My son] was upset because he came home to find our house door locked," recalls Tammy. Her landlord had abruptly and dishonestly changed the house door's lock over a rental dispute. Tammy had been making efforts to avoid conflict and resolve the situation, but unfortunately, the landlord took matters into his own hands.

Everything they owned, except the clothes on their backs, was in the house. With neither possessions nor a place to go, Tammy and her family were desperate. Fortunately, family members gave them temporary accommodations, but she knew she needed a more permanent solution—and fast.

"Finding a place to rent is not something that happens quickly," attests Tammy. Background checks, availability, and cost all factor into the time-consuming process.

Tammy is a spunky, intelligent, and friendly woman, who faces challenges head on. But the combination of uncertainty and anxiety started to weigh heavily upon her. Her family depended on her, and she could not disappoint them.

Looking back, Tammy realizes working at the Shrine was the answer to her prayers. A colleague, whose devotion to Mary's intercession through the Miraculous Medal helped her through difficult situations, told her about the wonders of prayer and the power of the Miraculous Medal. Hearing her friend's testament of hope, Tammy developed a profound connection with the Miraculous Medal and remembers thinking, "Oh wow, that sounds like the answer to my problems."

She began praying at the Shrine and twenty days after the incident, Tammy and her family found a home and security.

"The Miraculous Medal, the Blessed Mother, St. Catherine, and Jesus were there for us," Tammy professes, "...it was really miraculous."

Tammy shares her story with Shrine visitors, who may need encouragement and comfort to help them through their difficulties.

"I tell my story when I see someone struggling, needing encouragement dealing with their own troubles," explains Tammy. "I think about when I experienced a hard time, and how quickly my life turned around for the better through prayer and the power of the Miraculous Medal."



May Procession Features 1st Holy Communicants

Dozens of pilgrims gathered at the Shrine on May 9 to participate in the Shrine's annual May Procession and Novena honoring Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal. Fr. Timothy Lyons, CM, led devotees in singing *Immaculate Mary, Thy Praises We Sing,* praying five decades of the Rosary, and visiting religious statues throughout the Shrine grounds.

Among the faithful were seven- and eightyear-old First Holy Communicants from Immaculate Heart of Mary School in Philadelphia's Andorra section.

After reciting the Rosary, the First Holy Communicants processed into the Shrine with flowers and submitted intentions, placing them at the foot of Mary's Altar.

May is traditionally dedicated to honoring and seeking the intercession of Mary as the Mother of God and Mother of the Church. The Shrine has continuously hosted this popular devotional practice to honor the Queen of Heaven; to meditate on her love for Christ and His church; and to pray for her continual intercession.



Fr. Wes Chochrek, parish priest at Holy Name of Jesus, Kingston Mills, bestowed a blessing and the investiture of the medals to the school community. A Beyond SundayTM representative also gave a greeting and introduction to the event. During the Zoom call, each staff member and student in the

Kindergarten-to-Grade 8 school received a blessing and a Miraculous Medal. Miraculous Medals, such as the one shown, were also distributed to the staff and faculty.




INVOLVING LAITY IN VOCATION PROMOTION



· Elevating academic excellence and


- reputation through student-centered, collaborative, experiential, and integrative approaches to learning in preparation for 21st century careers

Annual Vincentian Convocation Celebrates Lives and Legacies of Healers

This year's annual Vincentian Convocation at St. John's University, "Be Vincentian: Be a Healer," paid special tribute to the late Paul Farmer, MD, PhD, who spent a lifetime improving conditions on a global level for the most impoverished populations. Dr. Farmer founded Partners In Health (PIH), an organization devoted to bringing the benefits of modern medical science to those most in need.

When acknowledging the life and legacy of Dr. Farmer, presenters noted how both he and St. Vincent were pragmatic innovators, who saw problems and addressed them directly, creating new models in ministry and the delivery of health care in settings of dire poverty. They both made sure that the care they delivered was more humane and more effective than what came before.

Held on September 22, the convocation is a special time at St. John's as the university community honors the life and legacy of St. Vincent de Paul, the founder of the Congregation of the Mission, culminating in his feast day on September 27.

Taking it to the Streets





The congregations of St. Vincent de Paul Parish and Faith Chapel Church in Philadelphia took their faith to the streets for the "Faith Communities of Germantown Against Violence" Prayer Walk. Fr. Sylvester Peterka, CM, pastor of St. Vincent de Paul Parish, said this prayer walk is more important now more than ever, after a devastating surge in violence on the city's streets.

Participants in the prayer walk carried signs denouncing violence as they peacefully walked, sang, and gave testimony at predetermined locations in the Germantown section where violence occurs.

"We need help," says Fr. Sy. "In our city last year, more than 565 lives were taken by violence. Violence is never the answer. We must let people know God has the answer and it is love."

Vincentian Ministry Since 1910


On Divine Mercy Sunday (April 24, 2022), the Vincentian Priests in East Central Alabama celebrated their final Sunday Mass with parishioners of St. Mary of the Mission Parish (pictured). The pastor, Fr. Vince Finnerty, CM, was the main celebrant of the bilingual liturgy, which is indicative of how the parish has changed over recent decades.


At the conclusion of the liturgy, the Spanish-speaking prayer group presented Fr. Finnerty with a plaque expressing their gratitude for his leadership and spirituality.

The event was a bittersweet moment for the parish. The history of Vincentian leadership dates back to 1910 when the Vincentians arrived in the area. The book, Centennial Celebration of the Vincentian Mission of East Central Alabama, 1910-2010, written by Fr. Vince O'Malley, CM, tells the story of the arrival of the priests.

As noted in the book: "Since 1910, 113 confreres have served in the Alabama missions."







GENERATIONAL DEVOTION, SUCH AS THAT SHARED BY FAMILY MEMBERS DEVOTED TO MARY, acts like a chain that links together a community throughout time. It gives families a sense of who they are and how to approach life.

Assunta Cerrato Romero was a girl of just 6 or 7 when she donned a ceremonial white gown and led her schoolmates in a procession through the streets of their Philadelphia neighborhood. The vibrant flowers of early spring lined their route as they processed praying the Holy Rosary.

Assunta had been chosen as the May Queen for The Miraculous Medal Shrine's annual May Procession. Today, that celebration of the Blessed Mother is among her earliest childhood memories of the Shrine. But, it is only one among

For Assunta, the Shrine has always been a second home. It is where her grandparents brought her parents, where her parents brought her, and where she brings her own school-age son to experience first-hand the beauty, grace, and solemnity of Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal.

"From those early days, I've always had a strong devotion to Our Lady," explains Assunta. "I knew [the Shrine] was a sacred place, a safe place, a place to come to pray and be close to Our Lady and get closer to her son, Jesus."

Like Assunta, Marylou Tammaro inherited a devotion to The Miraculous Medal Shrine from her parents. Although she was raised in a different part of the city, Marylou remembers how her mother, Mary Quinn, loved to share stories about growing up in Immaculate Conception Parish and attending the parish school on the Shrine grounds. Mary often told of the special bond she developed with one of the Vincentian priests at the Shrine, Fr. Bogart. As a teenager, Marylou began to accompany her mom on frequent pilgrimages to the foot of Mary's altar.

For many devotees, the perpetuation of family bonds...





"That's when I became aware of the Shrine, when I started going to the novenas with my mother," recalls Marylou. "It was absolutely beautiful, very moving. As a teenager, you're not necessarily into all of that, but having grown up with my mom, who had a great devotion to the Blessed Mother, she passed that on to me."

It's a devotion that Marylou then passed down to her own adult daughter, Christine McCauley, who—as fate would have it—has become a nearconstant presence at the Shrine as an employee in the administrative office of the Central Association of the Miraculous Medal.

Throughout the 95-year history of The Miraculous Medal Shrine in Philadelphia's Germantown section, and the 147-year history of the Chapel of the Immaculate Conception that houses the Shrine, there are countless examples of the type of multi-generational devotion exemplified by the Cerrato-Romero and Quinn-Tammaro families.







...has always been paramount to their engagement with the Shrine.

Envisioned and constructed by members of the Congregation of the Mission, more commonly known as the Vincentians of the Eastern Province, the Shrine is visited by tens of thousands of pilgrims from across the United States and around the world every year. They come to experience the beautiful Romanesque architecture and the inspiring Marian works of art. They come to breathe the glorified air and to heed Our Lady's message to St. Catherine Labouré in 1830, to come to the foot of her altar and ask for her graces.

For many of the faithful, their visits to the Shrine also fulfill and perpetuate family legacies. It is their way of thanking their ancestors for an invaluable and timeless gift.

"Actually, my grandparents were married here and my parents, of course, came here to the Shrine and brought us here," says Assunta, who currently lives in Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania, "and my parents continue to come here for services, as well."

"(Our family) had a great devotion to Our Lady because of what she has done, all the miracles she has worked," adds Assunta's father, Samuel Cerrato Jr., 92. "That's really what draws (us) here. I've been coming since I was a teenager, and I just believe the Blessed Mother is going to take care of us. ... We were taught we had to go to church every Sunday and to be good Catholics, the best you could be. In those days, times were tough. We started coming here as kids and believed that coming here was going to help us."

Assunta's faith in the Blessed Mother sustains her perpetually and has uplifted her during the darkest moments of her life. Three times, her sister has been diagnosed with cancer, but has recovered each time.

"The first time she was diagnosed, we came here as a family and prayed and asked Our Lady for her intercession," recalls Assunta. "And my sister was healed. Subsequent times when she was re-diagnosed, we continued to come here and pray. ... And, as Our Lady promised, 'I give you my graces,' my sister is strong now and recovering and healthy."

Similarly, Assunta sought Mary's help with her own health scare several years ago when she suffered what was initially diagnosed as a stroke. As she was being rushed to the hospital, her first reaction was denial. Eventually, she accepted her dilemma and began to pray to the Blessed Mother.

"Once I got to the hospital, I was perfectly fine," she says. "The physicians there didn't believe that I had a stroke. but the medical team confirmed it. (They said,) 'Oh yes, she had a stroke.' I attribute that miraculous healing to Our Lady."

Marylou believes that Our Lady sometimes bestows her blessings not through miracles that seem to produce instantaneous tangible outcomes, but rather through gentle-yet profoundrevelations for those who seek her graces. In 2009, when the Bensalem, Pennsylvania, resident was diagnosed with breast cancer, she prayed to the Blessed Mother not for healing, but merely for a sign that she would be ok.

Soon after, she was sorting through some of her deceased mother's possessions and found an empty box with something rattling around inside of it. Rather than dispose of the nondescript box, she opened it and found a tiny Miraculous Medal. A couple weeks later, she retrieved her mail to find a parcel from a friend. who had visited The Miraculous Medal Shrine and gifted her a second medal.

The very next day, Marylou and her husband attended Mass at their home parish, where they usually sit in the same section of the church every week. But on this Sunday, they inexplicably found their way to a different pew. As Marylou knelt to pray, she found an object in the missal rack in front of her.

"Surprisingly, there was a Miraculous Medal attached to a little booklet of the Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary," she recalls. "To me, that was three times in a row that the Blessed Mother was reaching out to me. ... The Blessed Mother was trying to tell me, 'Hey, I got you. This is going to be ok."


Indeed, the promise of the Blessed Mother's intercession with the Lord, even the anticipation of miracles, has inspired adoration of her Miraculous Medal for centuries and visits to The Miraculous Medal Shrine for generations. Yet for many devotees, the perpetuation of family bonds has always been paramount to their engagement with the Shrine.

"Receiving the sacraments in this place—because it's been such an important part of my life since childhood-is really a privilege and an honor," Assunta says. "My faith has grown because I have had the opportunity to come to this very special place.

"What I try to impart upon my young son is to explain to him that Our Lady and Our Lord, no matter what trials we have in life, will always be there for him. I bring him to the Shrine so, like myself, he can have a relationship with Our Lady and with Our Lord."





THE DEPTH OF A TRAGEDY, THE STRENGTH OF HER COURAGE, AND THE POWER OF SURVIVAL led Dr. Monica Montenero to a transformative, spiritual awakening to the message of the Miraculous Medal.

Healing the sick has always been a mission and avocation for Dr. Monica Montenero.

Born and raised in Rome, the daughter and granddaughter of physicians, Dr. Montenero served much of her career as an anatomical pathologist traversing the globe to recover body tissue from deceased donors to save the lives of cancer patients, burn victims, and others in critical need.

Similarly, commitment to the Catholic faith has been a longstanding tradition in her family, so much so that she initially aspired to become a nun as she completed her secondary education in a religious boarding school.

But it wasn't until she was forced to endure a harrowing home invasion many years later that Dr. Montenero fully embraced her personal relationship with the Lord through the intercession of Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal. Today, in continuation of her life's work, she dedicates herself to the spiritual healing of others through the Blessed Mother's uplifting message to St. Catherine Labouré.

Dr. Montenero enthusiastically traces the genesis of her spiritual epiphany to a terrifying night in Rome in 2010. Although she was living in the United States at the time, she had traveled to her native city on a medical assignment.

"I was sleeping in my mother's home, and I always sleep with a window open," recalls Dr. Montenero, "and in the middle of the night somebody came and tried to kill me. I was the victim of this terrible crime. ... I was physically attacked and full of blood."

Dr. Montenero suffered injuries throughout her body, including severe neck trauma, and the complete loss of her ability to speak. A series of surgeries and intense therapy helped her to eventually return to work. But after two years, she chose to retire and move to Madrid to be near her newly married son, Raffaele, and his wife, Macarena.

It was there that she attended daily services at Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal Parish Church, and where her devotion to Our Lady began to flourish.

Yet, tragedy struck again in 2018. While visiting a resort in the Italian Alps with her son and daughter-in-law to celebrate her 65th birthday, a wayward snowboarder struck Dr. Montenero resulting in severe injuries. Months of recovery followed, during which a volunteer from her home parish brought a miniature Miraculous Medal shrine to her bedside for continual prayer and devotion to Our Lady.

"I told [Mary], 'I'm going to stay like I am, and I don't mind," recalls Dr. Montenero. She adds, "I just implored Mary to please




help my son and daughter-in-law to have a baby, because they were having difficulty conceiving."

Within a year, Dr. Montenero experienced Mary's love and miraculously regained her ability to speak.

"I really love to sing when I'm in church, even though I don't have a great voice," she says. "Now it's great because I can sing in church. Like St. Augustine said, 'When you sing in church, you pray twice." Not long after that, Macarena delivered a baby girl they named Costanza. Eventually, the young couple had another child, a son, Filippo.

When her son and daughter-in-law relocated to the United States, Dr. Montenero joined them and discovered The Miraculous Medal Shrine in Philadelphia. Witnessing the Shrine firsthand has inspired her to start a visitation program in her new home parish in New York City, where volunteers bring a miniature Shrine to the home-bound faithful.

"It is really beautiful to be able to speak. It is really beautiful," admits Dr. Montenero. "Now I want to use my voice as much as I can to just spread the word, to tell all the people that [Mary] is the person to dedicate your life to, because she is listening to you and brings all your needs to God." 🙉



OUR LADY OF STONO RIVER: THE LEGACY OF THE KONGOLESE FREEDOM FIGHTERS LIVES ON TODAY

The Feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary is celebrated by Catholics on September 8. While not as well-known and celebrated, this next day marks one of the earliest anti-slavery movements orchestrated by Black Catholics.

Thirty-six years before Patrick Henry's famous 1775 call to rebellion—"Give me liberty, or give me death!"—a group of Black Catholics proclaimed the same message, chanting "Liberty!" on a journey to their death.

The Stono River Rebellion began on September 9, 1739, and is relatively unknown despite it being the largest uprising of enslaved people in the British colony of South Carolina. Some historians call it the most important revolt in North

American history. What exactly triggered the Stono River Rebellion is unclear.

As legend goes, many enslaved Blacks heard that small bands of runaways had made their way to Florida, where they had been given freedom and land.

The rebellion began close to the Stono River near Charleston, South Carolina. The date of the rebellion was significant to the people, who were Catholics from the Kingdom of Kongo (now Congo) and devoted to Mary. It's conventional wisdom that Blacks from Africa, who were enslaved and then shipped to America, eventually converted to Catholicism upon their arrival. However, there was a significant number who were Catholic before coming to America.

In their native country, September 8 was a day of devotion and fasting in honor of Mary for the Kongolese in Kongo and the British colonies. Known as their "national protector," Mary was especially invoked

during times of tragedy and conflict. In 1739, the Kongolese in South Carolina celebrated September 8 as a day of prayer and fasting, as they did in their homeland. Twenty-four hours later, the Stono River Rebellion took place in which the group invoked the Blessed Virgin Mary as their protector for liberty in the Americas.

The Kongolese Freedom Fighters, as they were known, raided a firearms shop and took ammunition. They headed south flying flags of the Marian color, blue. The group was hoping to reach St. Augustine, Florida—about 150 miles away—where fugitives were offered freedom in exchange for converting to Catholicism and serving in the colonial militia. Unfortunately, colonists killed about 30 of the Freedom Fighters, who were en route to Florida. Some escaped, but most were captured and immediately executed or sold to other markets in the West Indies. After the rebellion, harsher laws were enacted for fear of future rebellions. The slaves were no longer allowed to grow their own food,

> assemble in groups, earn money, or learn to read.


American Catholics today honor the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the anniversary of the Stono River Rebellion not to glorify the violence of the era but to harness the power of a faith and devotion to Mamanzambi, "Mother of God," which spans continents.

BENVENUTO!

In 1875, the Vincentians founded the parish of the Immaculate Conception (now The Miraculous Medal Shrine), which served predominantly Irish immigrants. Later, Italian immigrants arrived in Germantown seeking work, homes, and a place to worship for their families. The Vincentians of the

Eastern Province came to their aid, renovating the basement of the Immaculate Conception Chapel and offering it to the community for their use. They served the Italian community for more than a decade and eventually helped them establish their own parish, Holy Rosary.

SACRED HAT

This year, the Vincentian gathering of the General Assembly in Rome showcased a unique collection for those assembled. The artifacts, displayed in the assembly's adoration chapel, included a rarely seen relic of St. Vincent de Paul—his hat (pictured). Legend tells of how St. Vincent's followers (or confreres as they are commonly known) carefully gathered and preserved his clothing and other items. Among one of the more interesting artifacts is St. Vincent's hat, which he wore in his later years. As Fr. Stephen Grozio, CM, Provincial of the Vincentians of the Eastern Province, who attended the event, explains, "For me, it was a symbol of his missionary spirit, going out to the poor."


