Our staff will continue to utilize the UDL framework to support student well-being and learning using innovative, effective teaching and assessment practices.	 Using UDL principles, we will create learning environments which offer choice, flexibility and student voice. We will continue to purposefully integrate technology /SEA equipment into the learning environment daily, including accessing Technology SAT for "tutorials" (e.g., green screen, coding, etc.); effectively use alternative learning spaces – learning commons, outdoor classroom, stand-up desks, stationary bikes. 	Theory of Action: If, through student and teacher inquiry, we build and grow our knowledge of how we learn best, then our thinking, learning, achievement and wellbeing will ultimately increase.	Educators will focus their attention on the content of expectations in The Ontario Curriculum, Grades 1-8, that deal with fundamental mathematics, coding and financial literacy concepts and skills as outlined in the newly revised curriculum.	 We will continue to honour a 60-minute uninterrupted Math block. We will implement the newly revised Grades 1-8 Math curriculum by accessing the resources found on the site: Ontario.ca/curriculum Students will progress toward mastery of addition/subtraction facts in the primary grades, and multiplication/division facts in the junior and intermediate grades. Using Big Ideas and spiralling, we will connect the fundamentals of math to authentic/real-life situations that provide for meaningful practice in and exploration of concepts related to coding and financial literacy. Using diagnostic assessments, we will create learning communities to best meet student learning styles and needs; educators will engage in interdivisional numeracy co-planning to build students' knowledge and skills in Mathematics. We will utilize released EQAO math questions/assessments and exemplars to build student efficacy and confidence in completing multiple choice and openresponse questions (co-created learning goals and success criteria). We will develop comprehensive learner profiles and ensure a culturally responsive learning environment that incorporates differentiation along with an inquiry-based approach to learning. Educators will focus their attention on "Reaching Every Reader" across all grades, and ir all areas of the curriculum.	 Student Learner Profiles will be used to gain insight into students' likes, dislikes, learning styles, strengths and areas of need, as well as a means of informing effective instruction. We will continue to develop co-created learning goals and success criteria, and timely/descriptive feedback will be incorporated throughout the learning process in order to improve learning outcomes. The Science of Reading will form the basis of early literacy instruction as well as targeted support for developing readers to ensure that ALL students evolve into fluent, competent readers in every grade We will continue to learn about the five types of non-fiction writing (Recount, Explanatory, Persuasive, Procedural/Instructional, Descriptive) and the text structures that support each type.
